<u>February 8</u> – Keeping the Story Alive: Creating Family Books

Linda Munroe will tell her personal story of writing family history books, review decisions needed for self publishing, and discuss resources used.

She has authored two different types of books about her own

family histories. Linda is a retired school administrator. She enjoys the hunt for ancestors and has assisted numerous women in locating American

<u>March 8</u> – A Florida Family Homesteader During Times of Social, Racial, and Political Unrest

Family lineage involves a group of people descended from a

common ancestor. An ascending lineage begins with a younger person and traces ancestors upward to parents,



grandparents, and as high as one can climb the family tree. A descending lineage begins with a known elder ancestor and traces the family tree downward to the youngest known descendant . This is important for heritage societies, such as the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution. They require proof of direct lineage for membership.

Come be inspired by a story about Gale Pinkston's paternal, second-great-grandfather. It illustrates the kinship-proving process not only for heritage societies but sparks the fascination underlying all valid family histories.



April 12 – Genealogical Traps and Escapes
